	Ray Rosendale	Reconciliation Action Plan Mid Project Brief	 A copy of the draft RAP was sent out to FPAC Members with agenda as a supporting document. The Community Services Officer, First Peoples, ran through the mid-project brief and invited FPAC members to read through the draft RAP and supply feedback to the officer. Deadline for feedback is Thursday 21 April. This feedback will be provided to the next RAP Working Group meeting for consideration. A question was raised on FPAC representation on the RAPWG and attendance. Council confirmed that currently the Cultural Advisor (FPAC Chair) and one Community Member attend the RAPWG meetings, along with a third member to act as a reserve in case the others are unable to attend. This is in line with the Terms of Reference. A suggestion was made for the FPAC members that currently attend RAP Working Group meetings to provide a report back at FPAC meetings. Officers agreed to discuss this with FPAC RAPWG Members. It was noted that the Uluru Statement was a welcome inclusion in the draft RAP however it was queried whether Council had formally endorsed it. The 	

			Team Leader of Community Support advised that training to support this was underway for staff as an initial pilot group, then the Executive Leadership Team and Councillors would undergo training, as delivered by Deadly Inspiring Youth Doing Good (DIYDG). On completion of the training it is the intent that a Report to Council will be raised to endorse the Uluru Statement. This work has been undertaken after receiving advice in 2021 from FPAC around seeking some training prior to formally signing off on support for the Uluru Statement.

Destr	ry Puia	FPAC Terms of Reference	Presentation of final draft, noting that Council was seeking feedback on two specific items: the Term of the Committee and the Yarning Circle Model.	
			Term of the Committee – changed from membership being for the full term of Council administration to half the FPAC members being in place for the full 4-year term and the other half will conclude 2 years into the Council administration. This staggered term for FPAC members will mean that we do not potentially lose all FPAC Members at the one time, allowing continuity/effectiveness of this committee. It was noted that the intention is not to introduce this immediately, rather to introduce the staggered arrangement at this end of the current 4 year terms, which is due to be completed in 2024.	
			All at meeting were in agreement. Meeting Style – three options for the wording of the description of the meeting	
			style were discussed in regard to the use of the term Yarning Circle.	
			 High level statement around intent Detailed definition with a specific academic reference Wording related to Heritage Act. 	
			Currently proposed in the Draft ToR:	
			"As part of implementing culturally responsive and appropriate engagement, FPAC will be guided by a 'Yarning Circle' model, which is a traditional information sharing and learning approach. Indigenous	

			'Yarning' is an informal style of conversation that is culturally inclusive and
			distributes power equally among participants."
			It was raised whether layering a Yarning Circle model over an Advisory Committee model was inherently incompatible. A discussion was had which lead to a mutual understanding that it was still beneficial to have an informal reference to a Yarning Circle in the Terms of Reference.
			Chair asked if all present were in favour of keeping the original wording for the Yarning Circle description. All present agreed.
			General – It was noted that there were some inconsistencies throughout the document, using the example of 'Cairns Local Government Area' vs 'Cairns'. Language used throughout this document should be the same. Council acknowledged this point and will rectify.
			Background – discussion around the map under Background. It was agreed that further discussion around the Traditional Custodian groups and naming convention was to be taken offline at this meeting. It was stated that the inclusion of the map in the Draft ToR was not integral to the document and could be removed.
			All present at the meeting agreed to this course of action.
